Centre for Youth Empowerment and Civic Education (CYECE) is very much delighted to present some key highlights on the work done in the year 2023. Furthermore, this report will present some successes and achievements following the implementation of various interventions in the year 2023. Much as we all know that the year 2023 was a very challenging year in view of various problems which as a country we experienced, it is pleasing to note that we managed to successfully achieve over 95% of our planned activities. The year 2023 has been very challenging for many Malawians considering the plights experienced such as the Tropical Cyclone Freddy as well as recovering from the effects of Covid-19 among others. In other words, it has been a back-to-back moment of challenges and problems for majority of Malawian due to the aforementioned problems. CYECE was affected by the Tropical Cyclone Freddy in some districts which it works among them Machinga, Mangochi, Chikhwawa, Chiradzulu and Blantyre. Of these districts, CYECE only managed to raise funds to support a few families affected by Tropical Cyclone Freddy in Machinga district.

Regardless of the gains and the few challenges met, in the same year, CYECE winded up its 5-year journey with IM Swedish Development Partner in Mangochi. The 5 years partnership has helped CYECE to build the capacity of district stakeholders on various models necessary to end child marriages and of course eliminating harmful cultural practices in Traditional Authorities Namavi and Namkumba. CYECE also managed to secure new partnership with UNESCO under the Comprehensive Sexuality Education project. CYECE has been able to mobilize and engage local and regional partners towards SADC Regional Integration to ensure that we have a SADC that responds and addresses issues which affects citizens in the region in areas of trade, tourism, education, health, peace and security just to mention a few. These are some of the achievements and success stories for the year.

Once again, let me take this opportunity on behalf of CYECE Board of Trustees, Management and Staff to thank all stakeholders and partners that have supported the work of CYECE throughout the year 2023. The year has been full of experiences and lessons learnt to inform the direction for the organization. It has been a long journey which we have walked together and the achievements made are attributed to the support rendered by all the partners and staff members. It is our hope and belief that this support will continue beyond 2023 because by working together we can improve and transform the lives of children and young people including the marginalized communities across Malawi to realize their potential.

However, the CYECE 2023 Annual Report brings to light some notable successes which the organization registered but also the challenges which were encountered during the implementation of various activities in our catchment areas. In other words, CYECE has made various strides in the communities where it works in addressing socio-economic challenges affecting children and young people. 1.0 BACKGROUND

Centre for Youth Empowerment and Civic Education (CYECE) is a Non-profit, Non-Governmental Organization that was established and registered under the Trustees Incorporation Act of 1962. It is a membership organization where young people as individuals and youth groups register as members. CYECE was established and registered in 1997. The organization also registered as a Youth NGO in 1998 through the National Youth Council Act of 1996. Since then CYECE has been undertaking programs to meet the needs of young people and children in Malawi in the areas of sexual and reproductive health, child rights and meaningful youth participation. The organization was formed with the aim of addressing the socio-economic development issues affecting young people in Malawi.

GOAL: To ensure wellbeing of children, adolescents, and young people in their diversity by 2030.

By 2030, Malawi and the world at large is a climate sensitive society where children, and youth in their diversities are safe, empowered, healthy and are meaningfully participating in social economic development.

2.0 HIGHLIGHTS OF ACTIVITIES

2.1 Child Rights Promotion

Key Activities done in order to address strategic objective 1; To ensure that all children are protected from all forms of violence, abuse and exploitation and are realizing their full potential by having access to inclusive and quality early childhood development, primary and secondary education, health care and meaningfully participate in the society.



2.1.1 Community mobilization on child rights promotion

CYECE in 2023, through different projects, implemented a number of community mobilization activities, which include inception meetings with community structures. Inception meetings were aimed at introducing the project to community stakeholders and seeking their approval and support. Examples are the SCORE in FNS project in Dedza and the school feeding program in Mchinji and Dowa districts.



Furthermore, CYECE conducted periodic review meetings with Community Child Labor Committees in all catchment TAs on progress updates. Established and strengthened Community Child Labour Committees (CCLCs) in the target TAs of M'bang'ombe and Chadza in Lilongwe and Dambe and Mduwa in Mchinji. In addition to that, CYECE conducted meetings with FNS structures for review of the project in Dedza under the SCORE project.

2.1.2 Awareness raising on child rights promotion

Over the past year, CYECE, through different projects, has conducted awareness raising activities. CYECE supported parents' child communication sessions, including mother -to- daughter camps and community sensitization meetings on disability activities. CYECE in partnership with ministry of labour, TAMA farmers trust, Malawi Congress of trade union (MCTU) and District child Labour Committee (DCLC) organized a commemoration of World Day Against Child Labour in TA Chadza in Lilongwe with support from International Labour organisation (ILO) aiming at raise awareness on ills of child labour, tenancy and force labour.

2.1.3 Capacity building on child rights

Throughout the year, CYECE conducted trainings on the management of school feeding initiatives (hygiene practices, roles and responsibilities of committees, development of schedules, and data collection tools), as well as financial literacy to enable the schools to manage income generating activities. The trainings targeted the bakery committees who were trained on how to bake scones, buns and other confectionery in the two expansion schools under the school feeding program in Tasekela, Kaigwazanga, Pinda and Kankhande in Mchinji district, Chambidzi in Dowa district as well as Chimatilo, Kamuzu and Mtunthama in Kasungu district.

In addition, FNS structures in Dedza underwent capacity building trainings on household water and sanitation, food production and process utilization, nutrition pregnancy, food systems and GESI not leaving out VSL. CYECE also trained Community Child Labour Committees (CCLCs) in Community Based Child Labour Monitoring System to monitor their communities and act as watch dogs for improved service delivery by government stakeholders and trained youth networks of Makanjira and Kuluunda in Social Accountability and Monitoring (SAM) and advocacy.

Furthermore, CYECE trained male champions in nutrition and FNS structures (promoters, ANCC) were oriented on how they can plan and evaluate the FNS interventions. An example is the SCORE in FNS project in Dedza.

2.1.4 Provision of services for children

Through the different child rights projects that CYECE is implementing, in 2023, CYECE constructed 8 kitchens in expansion 2 schools and provided porridge to over 11,000 learners from current and expansion 1 schools. In addition to that, the Installation of playcenters commenced in expansion 2 schools. The structures include swings, slides, see-saws and monkey bars. The schools were also provided with games such as scrabble, chess, bawo, football and netballs. In addition, CYECE constructed 5 millers and 5 bakeries in expansion 1 schools in Kasungu, Dowa and Ntchisi districts as part of income generating activities to ensure the sustainability of the project.

2.1.5 Networking and visibility (partnerships with other organizations)

The organization also managed to work with other organizations in different networks on issues to do with children. For instance, the organization is a member of the All-In-All Learning Network in Malawi. This is a grouping of organizations in Malawi whose mission is to promote the right to education for marginalized groups of children. In 2023, the network managed to conduct several activities, for instance, the learning exchange visits and research study on climate change and inclusive education, whose title was "Exploring the impacts of cyclone Freddy on early childhood education for children with disabilities in Malawi."

2.1.6 Resource mobilization for child rights

During the year 2023, the organisation managed to source funding to support the child rights projects. One proposal was successful and the organisation received grant from International Labor organization (ILO)

Adolescent and youth health and wellbeing

Activities carried out in order to achieve strategic objective 1: To promote adolescents and young people's access to quality and comprehensive SRHR, HIV/AIDS, mental health, and general health care information and services

2.2.1 Community mobilization on adolescent and youth health and wellbeing

Under community mobilization through different projects, CYECE conducted inception meetings with the ADC to sensitize them on a new project. An example is the SET project in Salima. In addition, CYECE also conducted a meeting with community stakeholders to link girls/youth clubs to be supported in conducting life skills sessions and peer education forums in schools and communities through the Rise Up Speak Up And Act Against Child Marriage project in Mangochi.



2.2.2. Awareness raising on Adolescent and Youth health well being

In order to raise awareness on adolescent and youth health wellbeing CYECE conducted village to village youth week of activism on SRHR, child marriages and education, CYECE developed and produced posters of anti-child marriage campaign that were distributed to targeted community structures in the two targeted communities of Traditional Authorities Nankumba and Namavi.

CYECE also hosted community dialogues with different community stakeholders, including youth club members, chiefs, religious leaders, ADC and VDC members, as well as both primary and secondary school students. The main objective of the sessions was to increase young people's knowledge on their SRHR and encourage the rigorous commitment of community leaders in promoting youth SRHR.



In 2023, CYECE supported 4 trained community SRHR Champions to conduct 2 radio talk shows in order to reach out to more young people outside the project catchment area with SRHR information. The first talk show was aired under the theme "Investing in Youth SRHR" while the second one aimed at sharing the recommendations made to different stakeholders on the protection and promotion of youth SRHR with the aim of increasing the commitment of both Traditional and Religious leaders engaged in youth SRHR.

Furthermore, CYECE organized legal awareness raising meetings at T/A Mizinga Machinga targeting youth clubs' members to help them to analyse, question and challenge harmful norms and power dynamics causing SGBV (particularly defilement and child marriages). In addition, CYECE conducted transformative dialogue sessions on addressing SGBV where youth club members from Kayuni, Tigwirizane, Matwaya and Chituche were engaged and were expected to cascade the dialogue sessions with other community structures and stakeholders who are responsible for nullifying child marriages.

2.2.3 Capacity building/strengthening on Adolescent and Youth health well being

Previously, CYECE trained SASA facilitators in Dedza to be implementing SASA activities with an intention of ending harmful practices, unintended pregnancies and SGBV. In 2023, the SASA facilitators underwent refresher training to assist them in deliberately making efforts towards fighting sexual gender-based violence, unintended pregnancies and harmful practices. The training also helped the facilitators to effectively partner and engage relevant stakeholders from the community in raising awareness and taking action against SGBV, Harmful Practices and Unintended Pregnancies.

2.2.4 Provision of services on Adolescent and Youth health well being

Over the past year, CYECE has provided SRHR services and SGBV screening in Machinga and Salima under the SET and Prevention of SGBV in rural Malawi. The services provided include HIV testing and counselling, STI screening, general reproductive health consultation and contraceptives. This was done through SRHR community service fares and supporting health workers to conduct SGBV screening.





2.2.5 Networking and visibility (partnerships with other organizations)

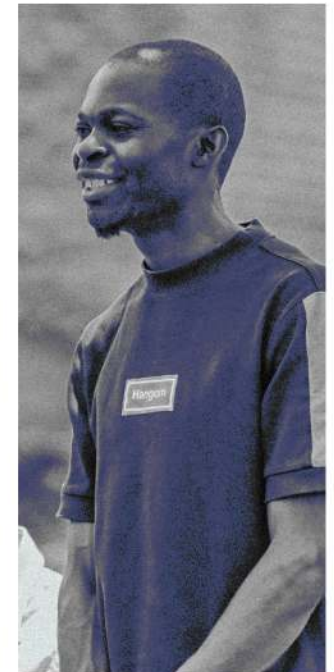
CYECE in the year 2023 partnered with UNESCO under UNESCO's "Our Lives, Our Rights, Our Future" Program, which is committing resources towards capacity building for improved CSE delivery in Malawi through the national training of trainers on CSE. Under the Strengthening the capacity of district SRHR actors in the delivery and coordination of Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE) for in- and out-of-school youth, CYECE conducted 8 sensitization meetings with CSE TWG and the DEC in Machinga, Salima, Mangochi and Dedza.

2.2.6 Lobbying and advocacy

In the year under review, the fundraising team held partnership meetings with different local and international development partners. CYECE engaged Malawi Scotland Partnership and Breaking Barriers on supporting Cyclone Freddy victims.

Youth development and empowerment

Activities done in order to address strategic objective 3; To promote empowerment of young people in their diversities for meaningful participation and involvement in social and economic development.



2.1.1 Awareness raising

In 2023, CYECE conducted a dialogue on the interconnectedness of Gender Based Violence, Mental health, and youth participation (16 days of activism campaign). The dialogue was aimed at raising awareness among the youth on preventing violence against women and girls under the theme "Unite, invest to prevent violence against women and girls. addressing these issues might increase youth's participation in civic and development processes, and by extension help in preventing mental health issues among the youth.

2.1.2 Capacity building/strengthening

CYECE conducted a series of trainings on youth right-based approach, mental health, climate change and leadership trainings. Trainings were conducted on mental health, climate change, right based approach and leadership. These trainings were conducted with CYECE staff and youths from youth clubs in Lilongwe, Salima, Dedza, Mangochi and Machinga. An example is the Youth Participate Project.

Furthermore, CYECE trained 15 YRA participants; the primary objective was to assemble a group of young people with knowledge, skills, and hands-on experience in Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (ASRHR) research. Having dedicated themselves to a comprehensive research process, the participants were to be acknowledged for their commitment through the receipt of certificates of completion

2.1.3 Networking and visibility (partnerships with other organizations)

In 2023, CYECE participated in the National Youth-Led Dialogue on Sexual Reproductive Health Rights and Youth Friendly Health Services. The event was done in collaboration with For Equality, GAYO, and SAT Malawi. Two youth, from the Youth Researchers Academy were invited to attend a National Youth-Led Dialogue on Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights (SRHR) and youth friendly health services (YFHS). The training aimed at equipping young people with practical skills on tracking health and SRHR financing and budget



Furthermore, CYECE conducted a market and hospital clean-up campaign in Kamphata Market and Mthethera Hospital in Lilongwe in collaboration with Nkhoma Synod Radio to commemorate International Youth Day. The activity was done to incorporate issues relating to climate change, which gained substantial engagement and support, raising awareness and encouraging positive actions among young people in different youth clubs around Kamphata community in Lilongwe district. This was done under the Youth participate project.

2.1.4 Resource mobilization

In the year 2023, CYECE engaged International Organization for Migration on possible partnership on youth empowerment programming.





2.4 Governance

The CYECE strategic plan ends in December 2023, and the team started drafting a 2024-2028 strategic plan. During the year, CYECE hired a consultant to lead the process of strategic plan development. The first draft was submitted, reviewed and feedback was provided to the consultant. The consultative meeting with stakeholders was also done in order to seek external input on emerging issues to be considered when developing the strategic plan





ACHIEVEMENTS



3.0 ACHIEVEMENTS

This section present a summary of achievements pertaining to the outputs of the organization's projects aligned with the strategic objectives. The data presented have been collected through robust monitoring and evaluation processes implemented across various projects.

3.1.Children especially girls and the most marginalized children are protected from all forms of violence, abuse, and exploitation and have access to inclusive quality basic and secondary education

Number of children reached with child development services disaggregated by district

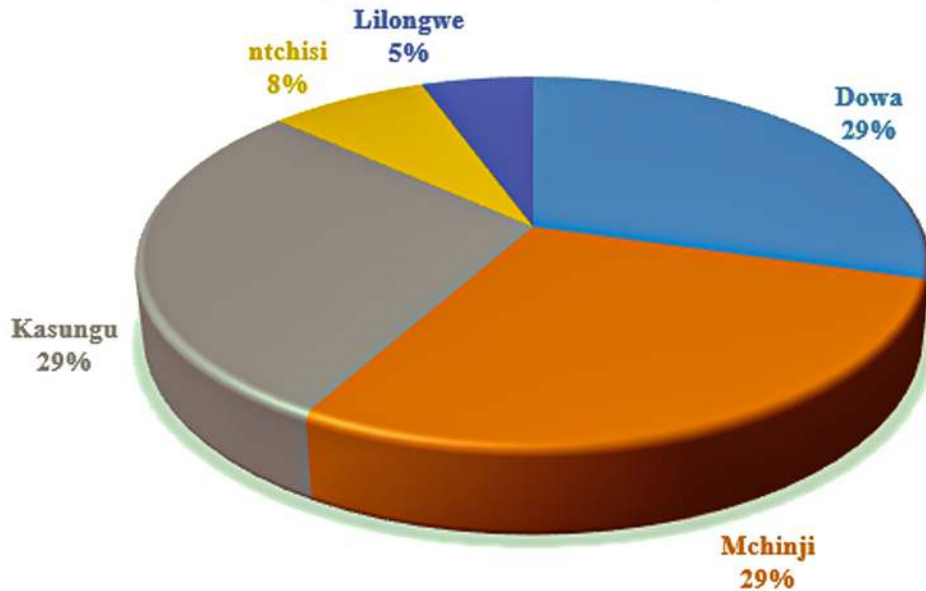

CYECE successfully implemented programs focused on fostering child development which encompassed education support, school feeding initiatives. Notably, from the total reach of 22056 children, the highest reach was recorded in Dowa, Mchinji, and Kasungu, accounting for 29%. This achievement is attributed to the presence of more schools and targeted interventions in these districts.

Number of children reached with protection Services

CYECE has implemented programs aimed at safeguarding the rights of children, among which are initiatives focused on combating child marriages and addressing child labor issues through identification and prevention strategies. These efforts have yielded significant positive outcomes, including notable improvements in school readmissions and increased enrollment rates in targeted areas. The impact of these interventions has been particularly evident in CYECE's operational districts, Mangochi, Machinga, Dedza, Lilongwe, Kasungu, Dowa, and Mchinji.

Child protection services reach by district

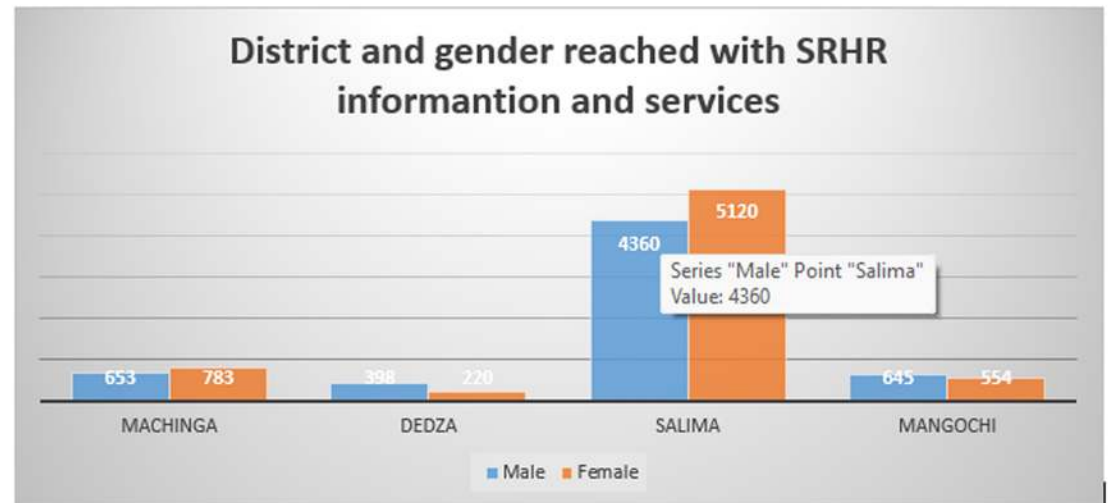


With a total reach of 2942 children reached with protection services from all implementation site, the graph presents percentage distribution of reach for some districts with highest reach.

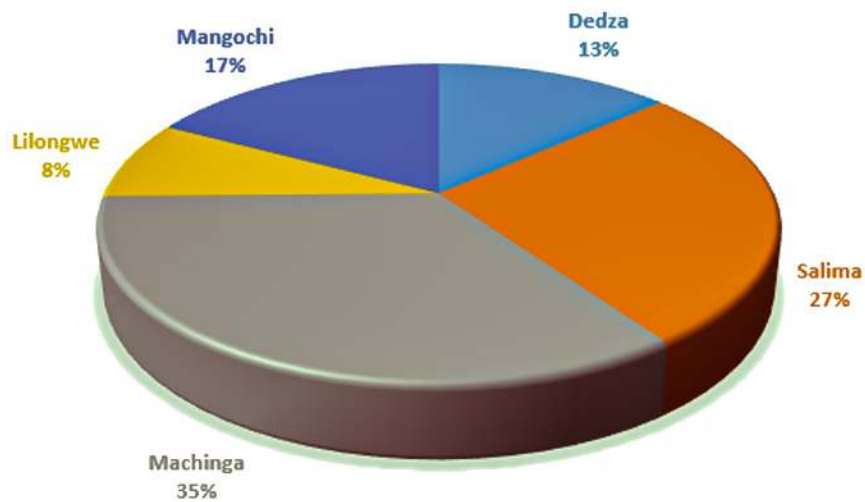
3.3. Empower young people and advocate for their meaningful participation in social and economic development

As part of its commitment to youth empowerment, CYECE implemented various interventions aimed at enhancing their skills and capabilities. A total of 3,251 individuals have benefited from these initiatives, which encompass Village Savings and Loans (VSL), Climate Change awareness, Sports Recreation, Life Skills training, and other interventions.

INTERVENTION REACH DISSAGREGATED BY DISTRICT



These activities have been strategically conducted across CYECE's operational districts, including Mangochi, Lilongwe, Machinga, Salima, and Dedza.

SUCCESS STORIES



4.1 Child Rights Promotion

EDUCATION FOR ALL

In 2023, Simbi School embarked on a transformative journey with the initiation of the Support for School Feeding and After School Initiative. Before the program, the school faced challenges, as evident from the baseline data for 2022 which revealed that no student progressed to secondary school. Fast forward to 2023 and the impact is staggering, as 18 students (comprising 5 boys and 13 girls) were selected to attend secondary schools, signaling a remarkable improvement in academic performance. The initiative, focusing on a nutritious school feeding scheme and after-school support, played a pivotal role in this success. Students benefited from school porridge enhancing concentration and overall well-being while the after-school support system provided a conducive environment for additional learning activities. This transformative success not only breaks the previous year's academic barriers but also revives community spirit, motivating parents, teachers and community leaders to invest fervently in the education of their children.



4.2 Adolescent and Youth Health and wellbeing

BREAKING BARRIERS: EMPOWERING YOUTH'S ACCESS TO SRHR SERVICES

Young people living in rural communities do not access sexual reproductive health services and information due to long distances to the service provision centers, among other reasons.

Young people from Salima are not spared. For example, youth from the communities of T/A Mkanjira have to walk a minimum of 10 KM to access SRH services to a health center that is in another T/A as there is no health center in T/A Mkanjira. With support from Amplify Change, CYECE is implementing Sexuality Education for Transformation in the communities of T/A Mkanjira and Kuluunda to ensure that adolescent girls

and young women have access to SRH services. Through this project, 20 young people from the communities were trained as community SRH champions. Among their many roles, the SRHR Champions advocate for the rights of young people to access SRH services. They provide information and education about SRHR topics, helping community members make informed decisions and dispel myths and misconceptions.

These champions also facilitate connections to health care providers and support services to ensure that young people have access to SRHR services. For example, the community SRHR Champions from T/A Kuluunda have collaborated with Liwufu Health Centre to supply them with SRH services on a monthly basis. These champions then act as access points for the SRH services to fellow young people in the communities.

There is a notable change in the attitude of communities towards young people's access to

SRHR services. Communities are now aware of the SRH rights that young people have. They are now encouraging and supporting them to access the services, unlike in the past, where this would have been seen as taboo. During a community SRH service fare that CYECE, in collaboration with Salima DHO, conducted, Group Village Headman Mpiringidzo encouraged young people to access SRHR services that were available at the fare. In his speech, the GVH encouraged young people to abstain from sex and said that if they cannot manage to abstain, they should practice safe sex for them to be able to live a healthy and productive life.

4.2 Adolescent and Youth Health and wellbeing

BREAKING BARRIERS: EMPOWERING YOUTH'S ACCESS TO SRHR SERVICES

The GVH also encouraged parents to allow the young people to access SRH services, as this is a good development. This simply shows that community leaders are now changing their negative attitude towards youth's access to SRH services. There is also an increased access to SRH Services and information among young people in T/AMakanjira. The SRHR service fare brought much-needed SRH services and information to young people in the community. During the fare, 73 young people (36 males and 37 females) accessed different types of contraception. 82 young people (31 males and 51 females) accessed STI diagnosis and of these, 40 (14 males and 26 females) accessed STI treatment. 38 young people (22 males and 16 females) accessed HIV Testing and Counselling while 50 (28 males and 22 females) went away with oral quick HIV test kits for self-testing. The fare also reached out to 46 young people (26 males and 20 females) with reproductive health consultations.
